





OFFICER OF THE YEAR SERGEANT JOSEPH SANTONASTASO



OFFICER OF THE YEAR SERGEANT JOSEPH SANTONASTASO



It is an honor and a privilege to present Sergeant Joseph Santonastaso with the 2019 Officer of The Year award.

Sergeant Santonastaso was born in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. He graduated from Deerfield Beach High School in 1998. He attended Wagner College in Staten Island, NY for two years on a dual Football and Track and Field Scholarship. He later graduated from Florida Atlantic University (FAU) in 2003 with a Bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice. Sergeant Santonastaso's father served in law enforcement at the Broward Sheriffs Office from 1982 to 2016. His father also ran the PAL boxing program.

In 2005, Sergeant Santonastaso was hired by the Plantation Police Department and graduated from the 234th Police Academy Class at the Broward College Institute of Public Safety. He graduated number one (I) in his class with a 97.75 percent combined overall score. Sergeant Santonastaso started on Road Patrol then spent time serving as a Detective in the Criminal Investigation Division where he investigated major crimes to include, but not limited to, sexual battery, robbery, and homicide. In 2019, he ranked number one (1) in the Promotional Assessment for Sergeant and was subsequently promoted.

While serving as a road patrol officer, Sergeant Santonastaso built strong relationships with the community he served and displayed a keen eye for detecting and addressing criminal activity. During his time as a Road Patrol Officer he on viewed 34l felony crimes which is the most by anyone currently employed with the Plantation Police Department. His compassion for vulnerable members of society motivated him to go above and beyond his call of duty when he repeatedly identified underage girls who were possible victims of human sex trafficking. Additionally, he coordinated with Detectives and Federal Agents that were assigned to these types ofinvestigations to make strong cases. As a Sergeant, he continues to coordinate the recovery of underage victims. One case was as recent as November of 2019 which led to the arrest of a 42-year-old adult male who was trafficking the child.

In 2019, Sergeant Santonastaso was involved in numerous major crime investigations as the lead detective, which resulted in eight (8) felony arrests. During this year, four (4) of his cases were resolved by conviction. These convictions were based on Sergeant Santonastaso's ability to uncover evidence, conduct interviews, obtain confessions, and document his results in a clear articulate manner. One of the convicted defendants was sentenced to 15 years in prison and another was sentenced to life in prison. All of his cases are significant due to the scope and nature of these investigations involving violent crimes against persons. The following case exemplifies his investigative efforts:

OFFICER OF THE YEAR SERGEANT JOSEPH SANTONASTASO



On February 13, 2019, an armed robbery occurred at 210 South State Road 7. A BOLO was issued and the suspect vehicle was later located by law enforcement in Lauderdale Lakes with occupants in it. Sergeant Santonastaso, who was the lead Detective, was able to speak with one of the occupants of the vehicle, and determined that she was not involved in the robbery. This occupant detailed that the other two occupants of the vehicle were involved in the robbery and was able to provide a name for the other outstanding suspect. The interview, conducted by Sergeant Santonastaso, tied the whole case together. Sergeant Santonastaso later interviewed the two arrestees and obtained confessions detailing their participation in the robbery along with the name of the outstanding suspect.

Sergeant Santonastaso also participated in other notable activities including outreach with at-risk youth in partnership with the Broward County Urban League, serving as a role model to the community.

Sergeant Santonastaso's personnel file is a reflection of his professionalism and dedication to his job. He has six (6) officer of the month awards from 2008 to 2016 and was nominated nine (9) times. Additionally, he has two distinguished performance awards and a unit citation award. Throughout his career, he has shown time and time again, his innate ability to look past the surface of the initial complaint or reported call and through his strong investigative skills uncover the true nature of the investigation.

Sergeant Santonastaso's years of dedicated service have proven that he is a great cop and his level of devotion and expertise to this agency is incomparable.

It is a privilege and an honor to present Sergeant Santonastaso with the Plantation Police Department Officer of the Year award for 2019.



ACCREDITATION





In November 2019, three assessors with the Commission on Florida Accreditation came to the city of Plantation Police department to conduct an on-site audit. The assessors were here for three full days and conducted file review, interviews with both police officers and civilian employees, and participated in a ride along with a police offer on the evening shift. At the conclusion the assessment, the Team Leader met with members of the administration from the Police department and informed Chief Harrison that we had successfully completed the review. The assessment teams findings and report was then sent to the Florida Commission for Accreditation and the City of Plantation was presented with the reaccreditation certification with Excelsior status at the following commission meeting.

The Communications Unit has achieved the following in 2019


- Received CALEA Reaccreditation

PROPERTY & EVIDENCE




The Property Unit is responsible for the care, custody and disposal of physical evidence, found property and other items held for safekeeping. The Quartermaster Detail issues Police Uniforms, equipment and supplies department wide. During 2019 The Property Unit had one Large Narcotics Destruction in April and one Weapon Destruction in October. The Property deposited \$ 29,318.28.00 from seized evidence and found property into the City of Plantation general fund. We received and packaged 15,483 evidentiary property including found and safekeeping and destroyed 12,182 from closed cases and returned 1, 687 items to citizens. The Property Unit and I.T. continue to provide civilian and sworn personnel updated Technology in File on Q and Web View.







CRIME SCENE UNIT



In 2019 the Crime Scene Unit had the following accomplishments:

- Responded to 1080 calls for service ranging from vehicle burglaries to homicides
- Submitted 1229 latent fingerprints to the Latent Print Examiner
- 147 suspects were identified from the submitted latent fingerprints
- Hired a 5th full time Crime Scene Technician making the unit fully staffed
- Acquired a UV Decontamination Box which allows us to disinfect equipment and avoid cross contamination of scenes







CODE ENFORCEMENT



The Code Enforcement Unit is under the direction of the Police Department. The Unit consists of (1) Supervisor, (1) Administrative Assistant, and (8) Inspectors. In 2019 the unit had 2,716 code cases which was down from the 2,956 cases in 2018.

TRAINING



The Plantation Police Department's Training Unit ensures that our agency personnel receive the highest level of training from our instructors who are both department and F.D.L.E. certified. We train on various topics including de-escalation, active shooter response, life saving techniques, ethics, and use of force. New officers are assigned to the training unit for In-House and Field Training. We have a rich curriculum to ensure that each officer is ready.
