Deputy Chief Schlegel joined the Plantation Police Department in 2001, where he has worked in various facets of law enforcement. He is a veteran of the United States Marine Corps and a graduate of Florida Atlantic University with a Bachelor of Arts in criminal justice. Deputy Chief Schlegel is also a graduate of the 62nd Command Officer's Development Course and the 283rd Session of the FBI National Academy. Deputy Chief Schlegel is a member of the Broward County Chiefs of Police Association, the Florida Police Chief's Association, and the IACP.

DEPUTY CHIEF JAMES DOURVETAKIS

Administration Bureau



Deputy Chief James Dourvetakis has served in law enforcement for over thirty years. He joined the Plantation Police Department in 1994. He has served in various positions, including captain, lieutenant, sergeant, and detective, within multiple divisions, including Patrol, Investigations, and General Services. Deputy Chief Dourvetakis previously served as a Military Policeman and a Criminal Investigation Division Special Agent in the United States Army.

Deputy Chief Dourvetakis has a Master of Criminal Justice Degree from Liberty University and a Bachelor of Business Administration from Florida Atlantic University. He is a graduate of the 277th Session of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's National Academy, the Southern Police Institute's Command Officers Development Course, and the Florida Criminal Justice Executive Institute's Florida Leadership Academy.

2023 HIGHLIGHTS

In 2023, the police department significantly improved its facilities and equipment, enhancing operational efficiency and officer safety. A major highlight was upgrading the media room's audio/visual system, which enabled clearer and more effective communication during press conferences and departmental briefings. The Street Crimes and Sergeant offices underwent comprehensive remodels, providing updated workspaces that foster productivity and collaboration. Additionally, implementing a "10 Zone" decompression room offered officers a dedicated space to relax and recover from the stresses of their duties.

Further improvements included the conversion of the Criminal Investigations Division (CID) breakroom into a fully functional kitchen designed to support extended operations during emergencies. The department also invested significantly in new equipment, purchasing a Medcat armored personnel vehicle, which is currently being manufactured, to enhance response capabilities in high-risk situations. The acquisition of drones and ballistic helmets for patrol officers further bolstered the safety and effectiveness of field operations. Lastly, procuring undercover vehicles for the Street Crimes Unit improved their ability to conduct covert surveillance and investigations, contributing to a safer community.

Three members of the Street Crimes Unit were appointed as special deputies with the Broward Sheriff's Office and joined the Homeland Security Investigations task force, bolstering our commitment to a multi-agency approach to combat organized criminal groups. We continued our partnerships with the Florida Department of Transportation and the Institute of Police Technology and Management for traffic safety overtime grants, leading to the purchase of speed measurement devices and a portable digital message board. The Traffic Unit participated in the Southeast Police Motorcycle Rodeo, benefiting the Concerns Of Police Survivors. Additionally, Automated License Plate Readers were deployed in the Gateway District.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

UNITS

Crime Scene Unit

This unit, led by a civilian supervisor, is comprised of civilian employees trained in collecting and preserving crime scene evidence. A typical scene will be photographed, processed for fingerprints, and any DNA evidence collected.

Crime Analysis Unit

This unit is responsible for collecting, analyzing, and interpreting data related to criminal activity. Their primary goal is to identify patterns, trends, and hot spots to aid in crime prevention and strategic planning. By providing actionable intelligence, they support investigations, resource allocation, and community policing efforts. The unit often collaborates with other law enforcement agencies and uses advanced software tools to enhance their analytical capabilities.

VICE, Intelligence, Narcotics

This squad of Detectives, led by a Sergeant, generally works in an undercover capacity. Crimes they investigate include but are not limited to Narcotics, Human Trafficking/Prostitution, and Organized Crime.

School Resource Officers

This squad of SROs, led by a Sergeant, is each assigned to a specific school. Every public school within Plantation has an individual SRO assigned to it, and the high schools are each assigned two SROs.

Crimes Against Persons

This squad of Detectives, led by a Sergeant, investigates crimes involving life or limb. These are usually more serious as the threat is not to property but rather to a person. Examples of these types of crimes include homicide, robbery, and sexual battery.

Crimes Against Property

This squad of Detectives, led by a sergeant, investigates non-violent property crimes. Examples of these types of crimes include burglary, auto theft, and fraud.

CRIME SCENE UNIT



The Crime Scene Unit is on call to support criminal investigation activities within the City of Plantation 24 hours a day and 7 days a week.

Whenever a crime occurs in the City of Plantation, these highly skilled Crime Scene Investigators secure the scene and collect DNA and other evidence to assist Detectives in their investigations.

Much of the evidence gathered by these professionals is absolutely critical in determining the guilt or innocence of the individuals under investigation. Once collected and analyzed, the evidence gathered at crime scenes can tell the story of how the crime evolved.

GENERAL SERVICES DIVISION

UNITS

PROPERTY/EVIDENCE SECTION

The Property/Evidence Section is tasked with securely storing, cataloging, and managing all evidence and property collected during investigations. This includes ensuring the chain of custody is maintained to preserve the integrity of evidence for court proceedings. The unit is responsible for organizing and returning property to rightful owners when appropriate and overseeing the proper disposal of unclaimed or contraband items. They play a crucial role in supporting the investigative process by maintaining detailed records and ensuring the availability and integrity of evidence.

RECORDS SECTION

The Records Section manages and maintains all departmental records, including incident reports, arrest records, and other official documents. They ensure that these records are accurately filed, easily retrievable, and securely stored to comply with legal and regulatory requirements. The unit provides essential support for officers, investigators, and administrative staff by supplying timely and accurate information. Additionally, they handle public requests for records, ensuring transparency while protecting sensitive information.

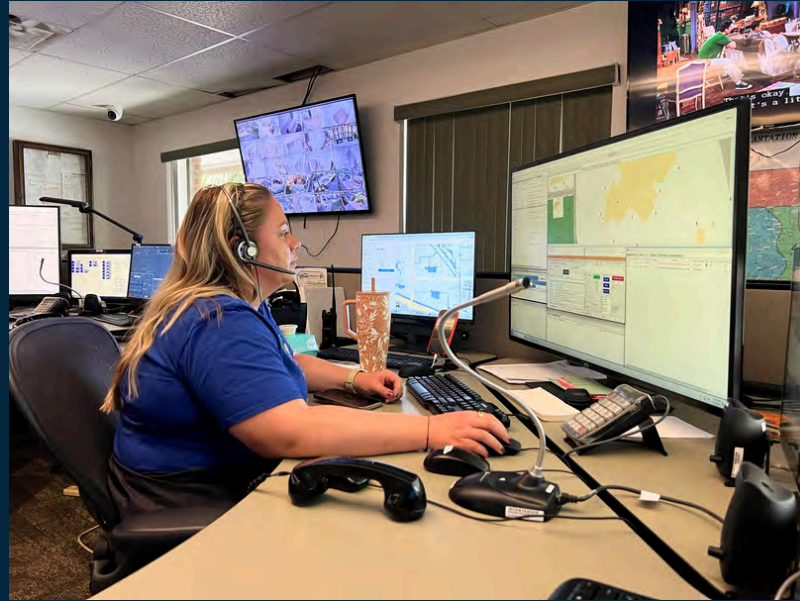


GENERAL SERVICES DIVISION

UNITS

COMMUNICATIONS UNIT

The Communications Unit is the critical link between the public and emergency services, handling incoming emergency and non-emergency calls. Dispatchers quickly assess the nature of each call, prioritize them, and deploy appropriate police, fire, or medical units to the scene. They provide vital support to field officers by relaying information, running background checks, and coordinating multi-agency responses. Additionally, dispatchers offer guidance and reassurance to callers during emergencies, helping to manage situations until help arrives.



SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION

UNITS

ACCREDITATION/ GRANTS

The Accreditation section is staffed by a civilian manager and is responsible for departmental adherence to the standards of both the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation and the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies. The Grant section manages various grants provided to the City, such as U.S. Department of Justice reimbursement for ballistic vests and the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant for new technology in law enforcement.

TRAINING UNIT

The Training Unit is staffed by two sworn officers and one administrative assistant who are responsible for the initial field training of new officers and annual State of Florida Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission requirements. The unit also has one sworn officer as an advisor at the police academy. The Training Unit is supervised by the Support Services Division Sergeant.

RESERVE UNIT

The Reserve Unit is comprised of part time law enforcement officers who augment the daily functions of the Police Department as needed. Reserve officers fill various roles based on personal expertise and Department needs.

CODE ENFORCEMENT UNIT

The Code Enforcement Unit is staffed by eight civilian code inspectors, one administrative assistant and one unit supervisor. The unit is tasked with education and enforcement of the City's code of ordinances.

SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION 2023 ACCREDITATIONS AND GRANTS



Annual File Review Completed with 100% Compliance

December 2023: PPD completed the annual CALEA file review for Advanced Law Enforcement and Communications accreditations. The file review consisted of a remote-based assessment with a CALEA Compliance Service Member (CSM). The assessment entailed a 25% review of randomly selected standards for Advanced Law Enforcement and a 50% review of Communications. The review also included areas of focus and organizational interviews. PPD completed all aspects of the review with 100% compliance, again demonstrating our organizational dedication and support of the accreditation process.

Grant Acquisitions:

Plantation Police Department Receives Federal Funds for Body Worn Camera Initiative

On September 25, 2023, the Plantation Police Department (PPD) was awarded a matching grant for \$400,000.00 towards the implementation of body-worn cameras from the Office of Justice Programs (OJP). PPD is one of 52 agencies in the nation awarded the 2023 funds. The total amount of grant funds awarded throughout the country is \$20,115,782. The grant will span three years, beginning October 1, 2023, and closing September 30, 2026. PPD has already started the procurement process to further the implementation of body-worn cameras.

SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION TRAINING UNIT

RECRUITMENT AND SELECTION

The police recruiter is tasked with identifying and recruiting the best possible candidates for the position of police officer as well as other department jobs. Selection is an in depth process carried out by many different personnel (oral boards, background investigations, psychological and medical testing) all reporting to the Support Services Division Captain.



RANGE FACILITY

The range facility is a state of the art training site where law enforcement officers maintain proficiency standards and qualify annually with their firearms. The range is staffed by the range master who is a part of the Training Unit.



PATROL DIVISION

CAPTAIN WILLIAM DORR

The Patrol Division is the largest division within the Plantation Police Department. Its officers work seven days a week, 24 hours a day, and their primary role is to respond to Calls for Service within the community.

When not responding to calls for service, patrol officers play a crucial role in maintaining the general quality of life within the city. Their duties include traffic enforcement, proactive patrols, and ensuring the safety and security of the community. Officers are strategically assigned to one of seven geographic patrol zones within the city to maintain a continuous police presence on each shift.

The Patrol Division is responsible for the majority of 911 and non-emergency calls (Plantation Police had approximately 85,351 calls for service in 2023). The Bravo Shift conducted 7,660 extra watches, and the Alpha shift conducted 6,177.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AIDES

Plantation Police Department's Community Service Aides assist with all departmental functions. They are spread out between the Patrol Division, Special Operations Division, Criminal Investigations Division, and General Services Division.

STREET CRIMES UNIT

The Street Crimes Unit was formed to create a proactive approach to street level crime within the City of Plantation.

The Street Crimes Unit works alongside Homeland Security, the FBI as well as the US Marshals to combat narcotics, gang violence as well as other crimes that can negatively impact the community's quality of life.

TRAFFIC UNIT

The Traffic Unit is a line of support that provides technical expertise to the department in the areas of accident investigations, reconstruction, and enforcement. This unit is responsible for the investigation of all serious and fatal motor vehicle accidents that occur within the city limits. Additionally, they investigate citizen complaints of speeding vehicles, illegal parking, and other traffic related issues.

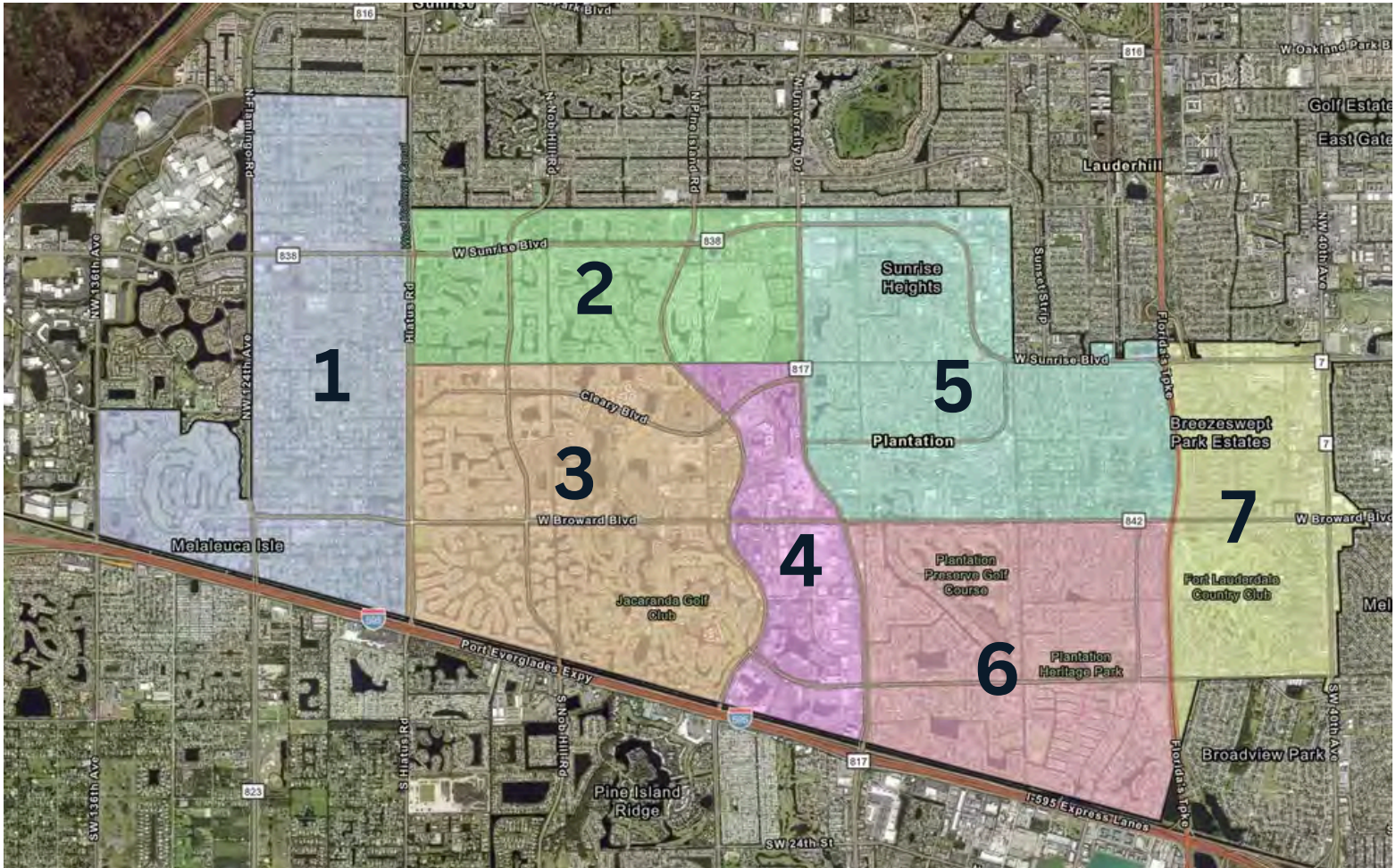

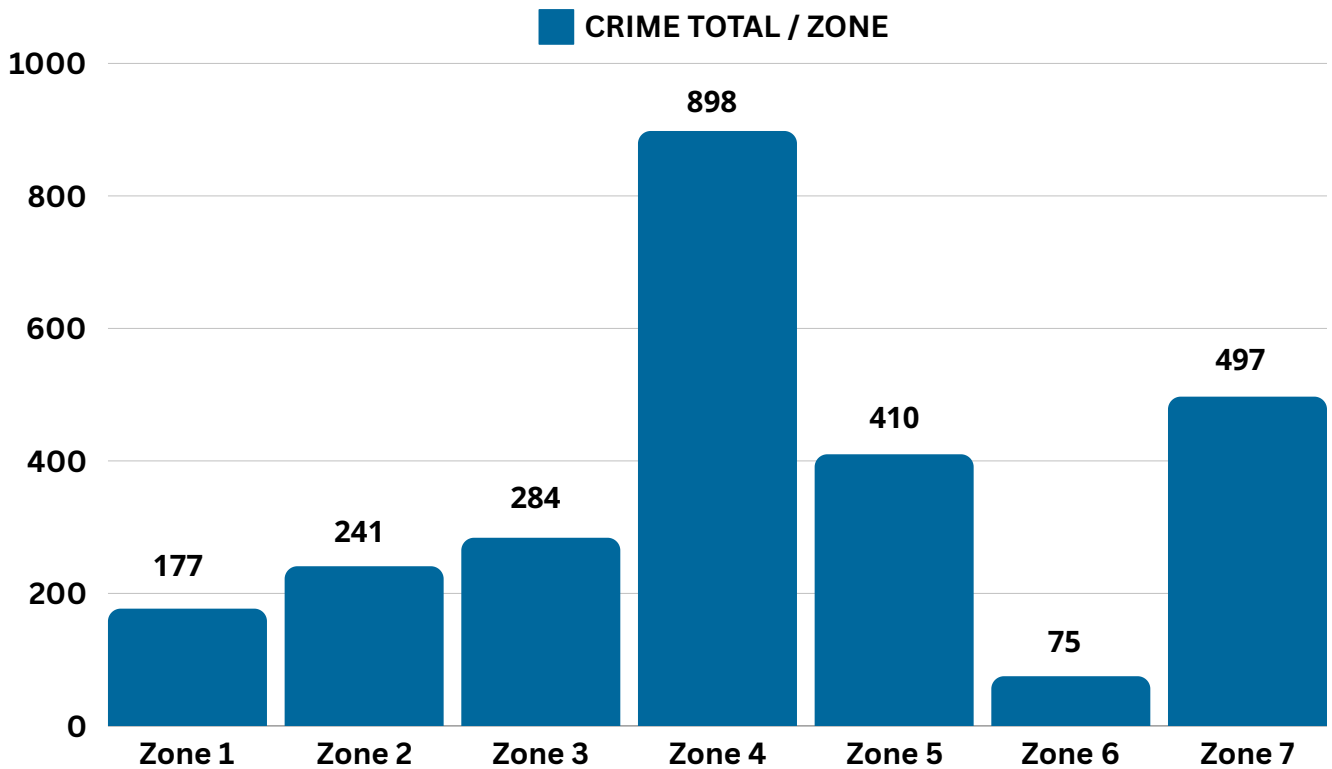




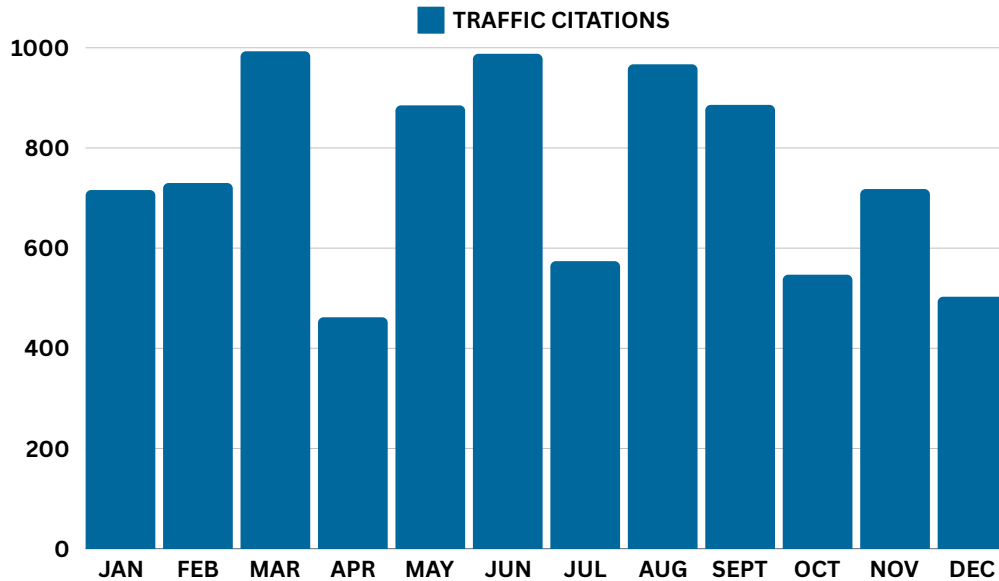
POLICE ZONE MAP



2023 CRIME TOTALS PER ZONE

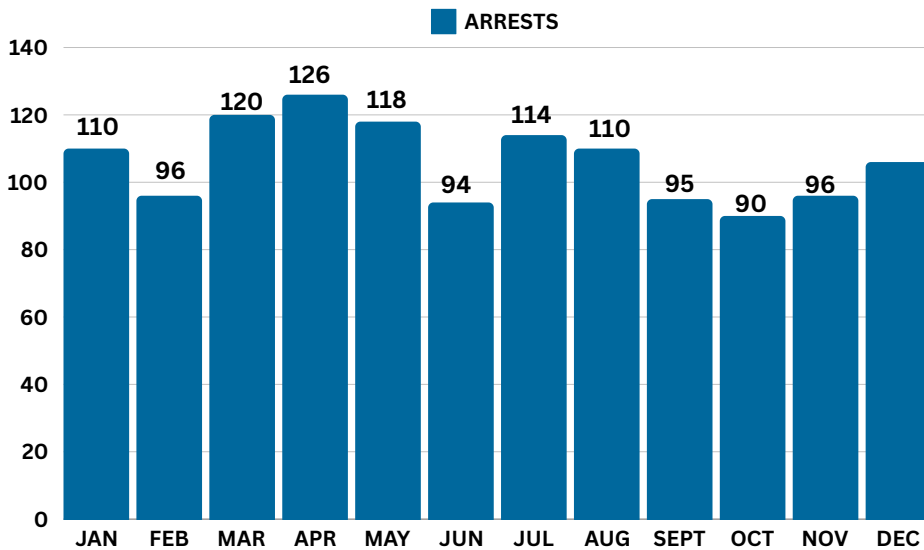


2023 TRAFFIC CITATION TOTALS

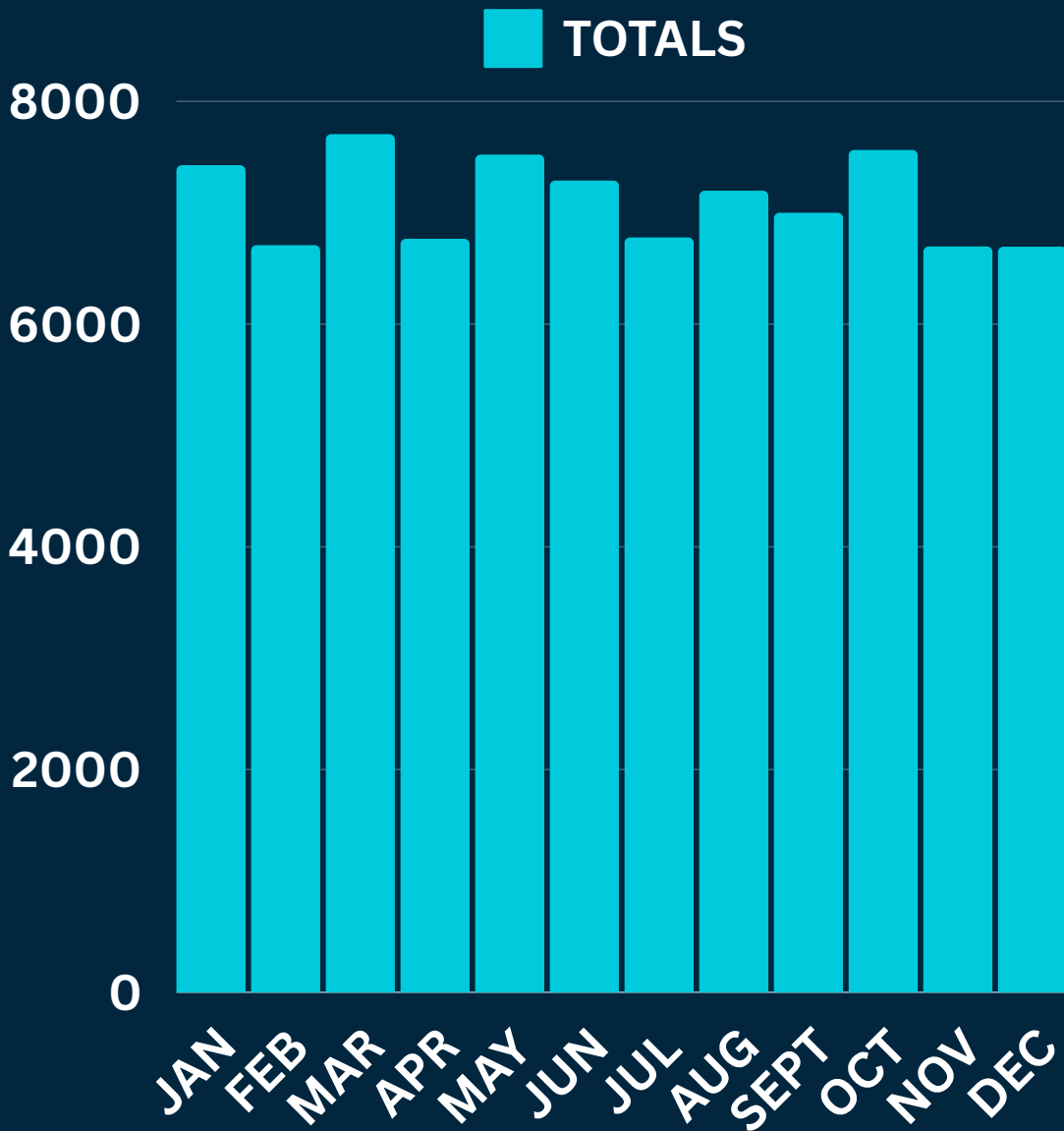

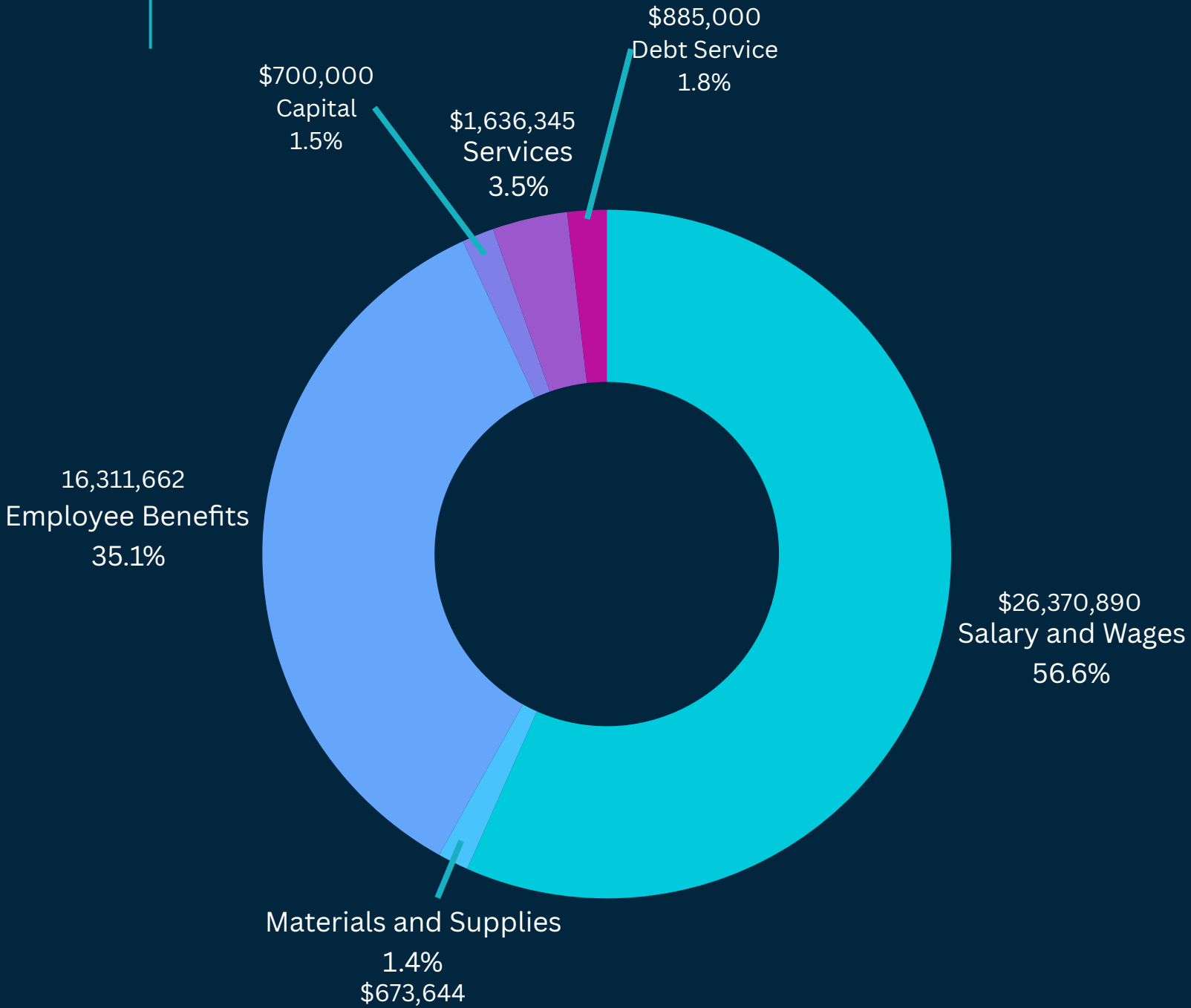

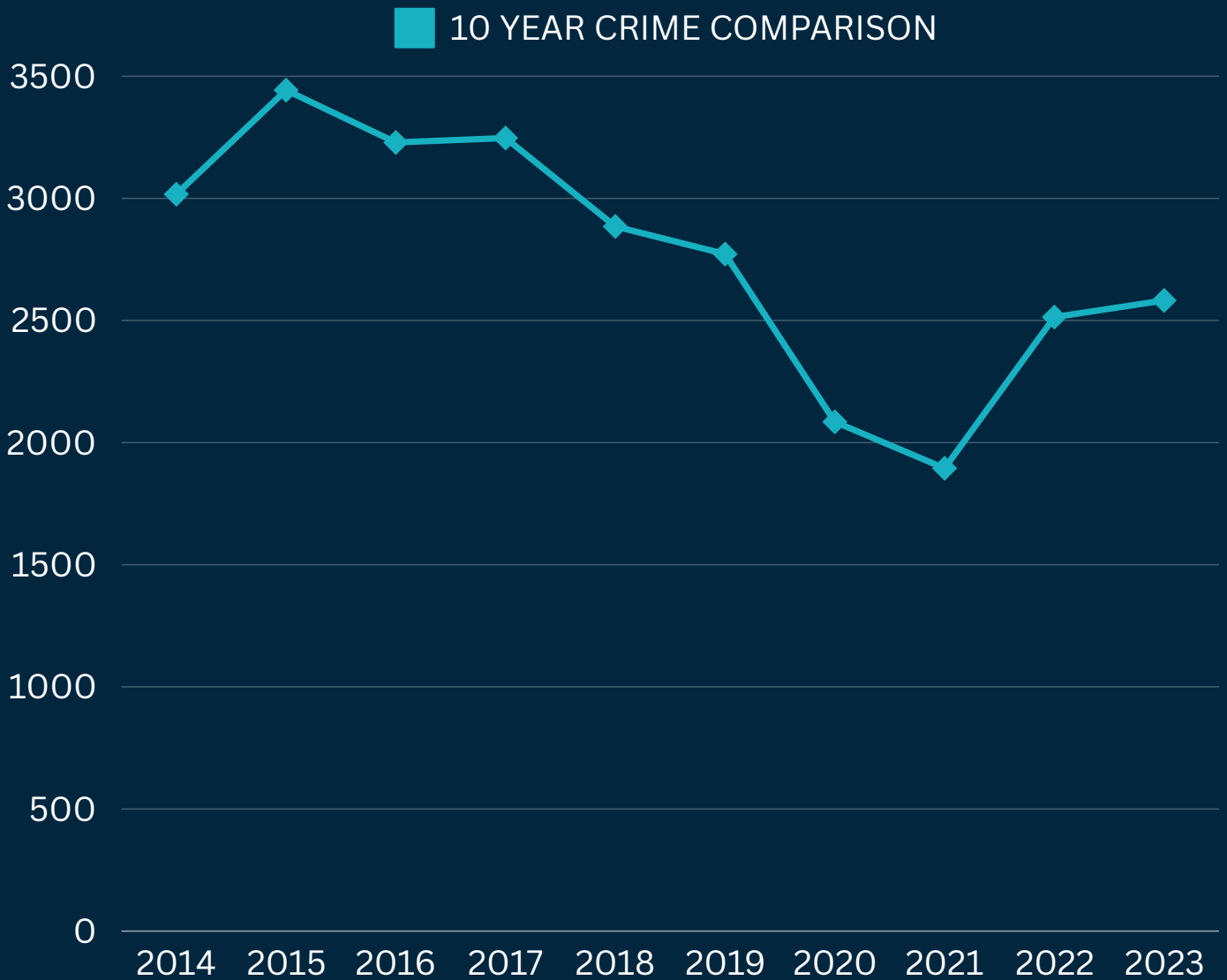
2023 POLICE BUDGET

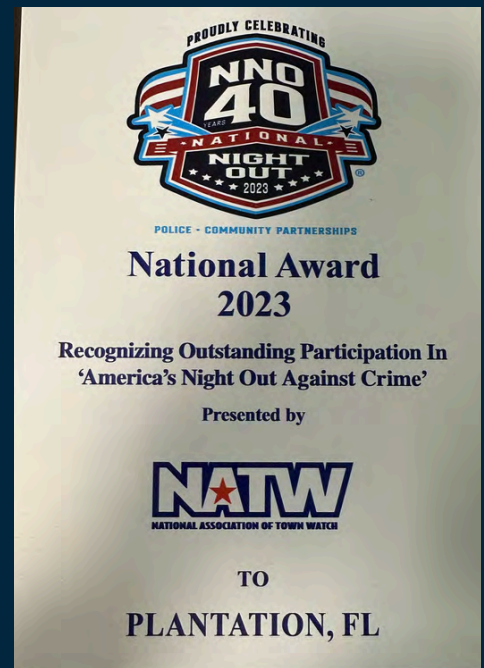
